Flights : Easyjet, British Airways, Ryanair and Luxair fly from London City airport, Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted.

Paris – Luxembourg

Direct TGV from Paris to Luxembourg, www.voyages-sncf.com
There are also Air France and Luxair flights from Paris to Luxembourg.
